have a regular updates from the Chief Constable and we are committed to doing everything possible to ensure Suffolk polic officers are able to continue providing the level of service the public would expect during the Coronavirus outbreak. He has the unenviable task of ensuring plans are in place to mitigate the impact of COVID-19 on his staff, whilst working with emergency service partners and other agencies to keep communities in Suffolk safe.

For me personally the virus has meant the postponement of the PCC election until 2021. This was as much of a shock to me as it was to everyone else, I thought it might be put off until the autumn but had no inkling that Government would stretch the postponement so far. Obviously, I am very pleased to be able to carry on; there is a lot to do and I am pleased to be guaranteed another year in this role.

It is particularly pleasing for me to know I'll be involved in the implementation of the plans made possible by the most recent
precept increase. The increase, which equates to $£ 10$ a year for a Band D property, will see 20 extra police officers across the county in areas such as serious crime disruption, roads policing and rural crime. This is in addition to the 54 new officers which will be added to the establishment by March 2021 from the government uplift.

This financial year's precept funding will take effect this month and plans are in place to improve the standards of police investigations; standards of police investigations enhance the Constabulary's capacity and capability to tackle serious and organised crime, county lines and knife crime; make Suffolk's roads safer and help prevent crime happening in the first place.

Seven of these additional officers will form a new, pro-active neighbourhood policing team, which will be deployable to any part of the county to deal with operational challenges. This team will comprise uniformed officers tasked to deal with violent crime burglary, robbery, vehicle crime and drugs. The remaining 13 officers will be deployed in an additional serious crime disruption team, as well as the rural policing team, the outcome resolution team, hew domestic abuse perpetrato meme and a new comm vehicle enforcement unit.

The precept, which will contribute to increasing the policing budget by $£ 9.6 \mathrm{~m}$ to $£ 143.82 \mathrm{~m}$, will also fund six civilian investigators to support the Sentinel teams introduced last year and the serious crime

disruption team and ten police staff working in areas including modern slavery, domestic abuse and digital support.

Last year's policing precept has been very wisely used and the increased focus on organised crime groups and county lines has produced some stellar results.

There is a page on my website which sets out exactly how last year's precept was allocated and the impact that it has had and we will be doing the same this year to show you exactly how your money will be spent and the impact it will have.

I hope all of you keep safe and well during these uncertain and difficult times.

## Ipswich West \& Hadleigh

On the West SNT, our officers have been focusing on our main policing piorty which is targeting anti-social this by conducting high visibility reassurance patrols at this by conducting thotspot' areas. At a recent public engagement in key hotspot areas. At a recent pubic engagement in
Old Stoke, local residents reported that they had seen a noticeable decrease in ASB in the area. We have also seen a decrease in the number of calls to us when compared to the same time period last year. With the warmer weather approaching, tackling low level crime and disorder remains a priority and I would urge local and
residents to report ongoing concerns to us using our website under the 'Report Something' tab. Advice on what to do if you are experiencing ASB can be found on our website under the crime reduction section 'First Principle'.

Our second priority remains the safeguarding of vulnerable people in our community who may be at risk of being exploited by offenders involved in the supply and use of controlled drugs. This practice is referred to as 'cuckooing'. We are achieving this by proactively place and identifying people who may be vulnerable or at risk of being exploited in this way. In relation to this, we are also working closely with our partners from the community safety and housing teams at Ipswich Borough Council in disrupting this activity. If you have any concerns about local residents who may be at risk of any form of exploitation, please contact us again through our website or you can report anonymously to our partners at 'Crimestoppers'.

From an engagement perspective our community engagement and support officers were active visiting schools and local events.

I have been involved with a large scale meeting about ASB in the Church Porch at St Mary's, Hadleigh. The meeting was very well attended and supported by local organisations/clubs and people. There were lots of very positive comments about moving forward. ASB in Hadleigh is still a priority and is likely to remain.

There have been a number of shed/garage and outbuilding break-ins in the area over the last month which has shown a spike in this crime in the area. Crime reduction advice has been passed out through Police Connect and through Twitter. This is also part of the priorities at Hadleigh.

From an engagement perspective I have attended schools and events such as Café Church and confidence café to talk about personal safety and scams and also attended Paddy and Scotts where we met lots of people in a great environment. This was very useful, promoting Police Connect and our further availability for events.

## Ipswich Central

Spring is finally starting to break but despite the all rain we had back in February, the clouds broke kindly for the Maple Park Sports activity week organised by partners, $1 B C$, along with our participation. PD Morse joined in the fun but preferred the play

from Ipswich Town Community Trust, organising games and skills on three of the days with the local children.

Midweek saw some gym park sessions to use the new gym equipment and coaching was available. Suffolk Positive Futures equipment and coaching was available. Suffolk Positive Futures with the kids, followed by some more football skills and team building. This group is supported by the Police and Crime Commissioner and creates a safe environment for children to participate in activities provided free across Suffolk.

Sidegate Primary School and St Margaret's Primary, both in Ipswich, invited Suffolk Police to do an input on 'people who help us'. The children demonstrated a really good knowledge of what we do and how we help people every day. Despite the snow flurry during the Sidegate Primary visit the children ignored the weather to look around a police car and talk about some the different equipment we use to keep safe and help people.

Once the weather improved and more people began getting out on their bikes we held a cycle surgery, kindly hosted by Taz of Spokeworx in Ipswich. This encourages people to sign up to Immobilise to register their bikes or any other property they want, to the service. Immobilise is a free service which holds a UK national property register holding over 28 million items of property This information is available to UK police forces through online systems and assists in returning recovered property to the registered owner via contact from Immobilise or police. Combat2Coffee have recently set up in the Spokeworx shop. The business was set up by Nigel Seaman a former Armed forces veteran, who formed Combat2Coffee following his PTSD diagnosis and now runs it as a support outlet for Armed Forces Veterans struggling with life outside of service.

As part of the anti hate crime initiative we were invited to the Bangladeshi Support Centre multicultural services meeting whe dozens oftaxi drivers in the area, from all different backgrounds, were invited to attend. The session involved listening to what they had experienced in the work place and how best to improve their safety and security. They were also advised on what constitutes a hate crime, as well as how and where to report it. It was important to let them know we appreciate the job they do, working late at night on weekends, providing safe passage home for late night revellers, helping reduce public order and ASB by clearing the crowds quickly in the early hours.
Suffolk New college hosted the "IT'S NOT OK" campaign against sexual and violent abuse. The campaign was supported by various organisations and charities, including The Ferns, Restitute (who support third party victims of violent or sexual abuse), Volunteering Matters and Fresh Start New Beginnings that provides a therapeutic service for victims of child sexual abuse. It was encouraging to hear the work that goes on for victims and third party victims, long after police investigations have come to a close.

It has been a busy few weeks in the north east of pswich. "Mark it at the Market" was a successful bik marking event held at Kesgrave community market, where we saw a great turn out despite the windy weather and got a good number of bikes security marked, giving crime prevention advice along the way. Later in February the SNT worked together with Suffolk County Council (housing and community engagement) and community youth workers providing a police surgery "Brew with a Bobby" at Gainsborough Library. Further bikes were marked and local youths took advice on how to ride responsibly in their community

We had a lovely welcome from the 31st/9th Ipswich Scout Group who were jus one of the groups I met and discussed the importance of online and persona safety. More recent crime prevention and awareness engagements have been discussing knife crime
